AP COMPARATIVE GOVERNMENT AND POLITICS SYLLABUS Ms. Bookman

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COURSE OBJECTIVE

The object of this course is to introduce students to the broad field of comparative politics as well as to teach students the specifics about the conduct of politics in various countries. This course will look at politics in three very different kinds of settings: advanced industrial societies, communist or former communist systems and developing or Third World countries. Six countries will be used in order to help further comprehension of these settings: Great Britain, Russia, China, Nigeria, Mexico, and Iran. By looking at more than one country within each setting, students will see the substantial variations that exist within as well as across different categories of political systems. Throughout the course, students will look successively at different aspects of these systems – their historical backgrounds, political cultures, interest groups, party systems and elections, political structures and leadership recruitment processes and the policy making processes – in order to compare the attributes and performance characteristics of these general systems.

This course follows the College Board guidelines and is the equivalent of an introductory-level college course in comparative politics. The course objectives are broken down using the College Board "Scoring Components" 1-12 in addition to the "Course Topics" I-VI as indicated as the chart below. At the conclusion of the AP Comparative Government and Politics course students will be able to understand major theories used to explain political organizations, processes and policies in comparative politics, understand the working of different political systems and describe and understand politics in any country based on concepts learned in the course. In addition to preparation for the Advanced Placement exam in May 2014, students will also be prepared for the increasingly globalized world in which they live.

AP EXAM

The AP Comparative Government and Politics exam is 2 hours and 30 minutes in length and will be taken the morning of **Thursday, May 14th, 2020**

The AP Comparative Government and Politics Exam assesses student understanding of the disciplinary practices and learning objectives outlined in the course framework. The exam is 2 hours and 30 minutes long and includes 55 multiple-choice questions and 4 free-response questions. The details of the exam, including exam weighting and timing, can be found below.
